Baskin-Robbins' spirit of fun and innovation has captured notable moments in American history through its unique ice cream flavors. When the Dodgers moved from Brooklyn to Los Angeles in 1957, Baskin-Robbins commemorated the move with Baseball Nut. In 1964, when Beatlemania struck the United States, a new flavor called Beatle Nut hit Baskin-Robbins shops. When the first astronauts set foot on the moon in 1969, Lunar Cheesecake also landed in Baskin-Robbins shops. In 2002, Shrek Swirl was introduced, celebrating the animated hit movie and its star green ogre.



Today, Baskin-Robbins continues the tradition of creating ice cream flavors around historic moments and periods as well as honoring pop cultural figures, both real and fictional.
